## Bolton sixth form college bursary

8th July 2021 — Four new Sixth Form bursaries are to become available at Bolton School Boys’ Division, thanks to a £100,000 donation from Old Boy Adam Crook. Adam, who left Bolton School in 1992, has recently been promoted to the partnership at Goldman Sachs, the American investment banking firm, and the donation has been arranged through the Goldman Sachs (GS) Gives Fund. The fund can be used by Partners at their discretion to support charities and projects which meet key criteria, including social mobility – a key strategic priority for the School which it helps deliver through its bursary scheme. From September 2021, and for the following three academic years, a bursary recipient will begin their studies in the Sixth Form of the Boys’ Division, having had their fees paid in full by the Adam Crook/GS Gives Bursary. The recipients will be chosen after consideration of their academic ability and their family’s financial circumstances, in line with the School’s bursary criteria. Adam has strong personal reasons for wanting to make the donation. He reflected: ‘Looking back at my own family history, it’s only really in the last couple of generations that there has been genuine potential for social mobility, through access to education and a broader more meritocratic society. Education is transformational and for my grandparents, growing up in Bolton, today’s opportunities were just not available. Every child should have the opportunity to fulfil their academic potential and that shouldn’t just be a function of where you grow up or whether your parents can afford it.’ Looking back on his time at Bolton School, Adam said: ‘I do think the school offers something unique and truly opens children’s eyes to opportunities in the community and beyond. I would love to be able to support some of those children who can’t take advantage of these opportunities because of family circumstances.’ ‘Being at a US firm, the ethos of donating to a former school or college is quite engrained. It made sense to me, along with some other things I am doing with Veterans’ charities, to give something back to my old school and community. The school Bursary Scheme does an excellent job broadening access to education across the community and I would encourage any former pupil, who finds him- or herself in a position where they are able to help, to consider contributing to this effort.’ Adam is looking forward to acting as a mentor to the recipients of the Adam Crook/GS Gives Bursary, if they would like this, and to offering them advice and guidance as they navigate their Sixth Form studies and beyond. Headmaster of the Boys’ Division at Bolton School, Philip Britton, said: ‘These bursaries will make a difference not just to the young people who receive them but also to those in the communities they will be part of in later life as they live out the values that we promote here and use their talents for the greater good. There could be no better example of that than Adam’s own personal success leading to him giving these bursaries.’ During the last academic year, Bolton School spent £2.89m supporting bursary places for able students whose family circumstances meant they would otherwise be unable to attend. Currently 350, one in five, Senior School pupils receives financial help with their schooling, with one third of recipients – 6% of the pupil body – receiving fully-funded bursaries. The School remains intent upon its long-term ambition to deliver needs-blind access to the transformational education it offers, and this gift will make a significant contribution to that aim. To date, GS Gives has made nearly \$1.8 billion in grants and partnered with 8,000 non-profitable organisations in 100 countries around the world. We run a very successful bursary and travel scheme at The Sixth Form that helps support a large proportion of our students financially to overcome barriers in education. Bursary If your parents or guardians household income is less than £20,000 per year and they are in receipt of any income-based benefit such as Working Tax Credit you may qualify for a bursary to help with associated college costs. This is means tested and is dependent on individual family circumstances. When you enrol as a student you will have the opportunity to apply via your Student Portal. Free Meals and Bursary Free meals/snacks and drinks are provided at The Sixth Form to the value of a daily amount of £3.25 dependent on if your parents or guardians are in receipt of certain benefits including: Income Support, Universal Credit or ESA. If the free meals application is successful, you will also qualify for a weekly bursary to help you with associated college costs. When you enrol as a student you will have the opportunity to apply via your Student Portal. More information will be available when you enrol. Travel Students living more than four miles from The Sixth Form and who also live outside of Greater Manchester are eligible for help with weekly travel costs. This is not means tested. More information is available at Student Information when you enrol. For a one-off £10 administration fee, Our Pass provides free travel on most local buses across Greater Manchester. It also gives members half-price off peak one day and weekend travel cards on Metrolink. For students that live within Greater Manchester GM resident students aged 16-18 could be eligible for free travel using GM Our Pass. However, if you use other types of public transport to normally attend The Sixth Form or live outside of Greater Manchester, funds may be available to assist you with travel costs. ADAM: I applied for my bursary in my final year of GCSEs, at the beginning of Year 11. The bursary was a part of my application for the school’s Sixth Form, where I had decided I wanted to sit my A-Levels. Can you give me a timeline of the application stage? It was a small part of the application process. Once I had been shown around and was confident I still wanted to apply, the application forms were submitted. Once interviews had been completed and I was made an offer, financial information was given to the school in a filled-in application form and accompanied with supporting evidence. How much did you know about the bursaries on offer at Bolton School? I was quite familiar with the bursary because I knew, as Bolton School was a private school, it’d be my only means of being able to attend. The application for this was a small part, after I had proved to the school that I was worthy of a place by means of a test and a series of interviews. My application for the bursary was made after my place was confirmed so there was some worry that due to my financial background, although I have a place, I may not be able to attend if the full bursary funding I required couldn’t be offered to me. Happily, this wasn’t the case and once financial documentation was submitted, the school was more than happy to fund me for my two years of Sixth Form there on a full bursary. Did you have the bursary provision for the entirety of your Sixth Form years? Yes. Between Years One and Two there’s a need to submit financial documentation, just to prove that my circumstances had remained the same. Did you apply for a bursary to more than one school? I applied for a bursary only at Bolton School because all my other Sixth Form and college choices were state schools. Which members of staff knew that you had a bursary and did your peers know that you had one? Some members of staff, for example, my heads of year and senior members were aware of my bursary. Most teachers and pupils were unaware of this unless it was made clear by myself that I was on a bursary. The interesting thing here was that a high percentage of my peers were also helped in some way by the bursary scheme, so it was never something that was frowned upon if you were a pupil helped by the scheme. Was that your decision or school policy? For the reasons that I’ve stated, it was entirely my decision who knew I had a bursary and who didn’t, but it was never asked and no pressure was put on me to tell others about my financial background. It was something I could open up about with others that I felt comfortable with if I chose to, including staff. What qualities do you have to have to consider applying for a bursary? I believe the main quality is having a desire to learn and get involved with school life wholeheartedly. I feel like this needs to be considered when applying because most bursaries are offered on the basis of academic achievement. If you have a desire to achieve and are committed to working hard, it will inevitably happen and this is the best way to ensure you can fulfil your time here, and, to say thank you for being given the opportunity. What financial checks does the school make? They need details of annual income and bank statements. Remember you may have to prove your identity and possibly confirm residency status and household income. Allow plenty of time for submission of your application and all supporting evidence. Continuing students You’re a ‘continuing student’ if you got finance last year. Log in to your student finance account and apply online. Tuition Fee Loan Full time students can apply for a tuition fee loan to cover fee costs up to £9,000 per annum. Help with the cost of living – Maintenance Loans Full-time students from the UK can apply for a maintenance loan for living costs. You may have to give details of your household income (parents’/partner’s income plus yours). The loan is paid directly into your bank account at the start of term. You have to pay the loan back. Students can apply for the following Living at home – Up to £4,565 Living away from home, outside of London – Up to £5,740 Use the student finance calculator to estimate your Maintenance Loan. Repayment of tuition and maintenance loans for full-time students Your repayments are linked to your income. You only make repayments when your income is over a certain amount.
