



## What are the short and long vowels

A long vowel is a vowel sound that is pronounced like "yoo," as would be the case in words like "cub" and "tub." Long vowel words, then, are words that contain a long vowel sound. It's important to note that the spelling of a word and the way it sounds don't always match up so perfectly. Words like "few" and "gate" can also be spelled like "ay" (as in "paid"), among other variations. To understand this further, let's look at some more examples of long vowel words.
